II. The Internal Evaluation procedure

 Comments concerning the quality and the completeness of the application submitted by the institution of higher education (Doc. Number 200.1), as well as concerning the overall acceptance of and participation in the quality assurance procedures, by the institution in general and by the program of study under evaluation in particular.

200.1 is of high quality in general but Annex 5 often lacked sufficient elaborating justification for the responses given. The committee noted small errors in the content of 200.1 to the Global College. The quality assurance procedures were sufficiently engaged with by staff.

The programme includes enthusiasm staff dedicated to imparting a professional spirit within their student population. However, some academic staff are teaching across a wide range of topics for which they have limited formal education.

Overall, the committee was satisfied with the purpose of the program, its curriculum includes a wide range of theoretical and practical topics, it is manged effectively and adheres to quality assurance procedures. One of its core strengths is its connection with the security industry labor market. With regard its international dimension, aspects of this, particularly in relation to academic exchange, could be improved (see below).

While staff are able to draw on work experience and consultancies, there is little direct research teaching synergy because the extent and quality of the research undertaken is patchy between staff and limited overall.

The programme and the College overall are professionally managed with a supportive atmosphere for students, but the physical library infrastructure are in need of improvement. The program appears financially stable given social demands for security personnel.

CONCLUSIONS AND SUGGESTIONS OF THE EXTERNAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE¹

 The present situation of the program, good practices, weaknesses that have been detected during the external evaluation procedure by the external evaluation committee, suggestions for improvement.

The program offers a unique contribution to Cypriot higher education (even southeast Europe) and it staffed by enthusiastic personnel who teach equally enthusiastic students. It promises to train students in a manner highly relevant to labor market requirements. However, the program needs to improve the depth and the quality of its academic dimensions. For instance, a limited number of staff teach the bulk of security specific modules, and do so across a wide range of substantive topics which are outside of their specializations. The research standards of staff also need to be improved. The College's library needs further expansion.

Few staff are involved in research and overall the staff have a poor publication output record. It seems reasonable to conclude this is an outcome of the demands of their other duties.

With regard to subject specialization, some staff are teaching many modules and ones highly varied in content that go beyond their areas of educational qualification.

With regard to the content of the modules, in a security program such as this, it is noticeable that there are no modules dealing directly with (1) the international political conditions shaping security threats; (2) the ethics of security dilemmas as well as human rights and privacy; (3) and human counselling skills. In addition, a student representative noted the need for further health and safety instruction.

The limited extent of research undertaken by staff curtails the scope for the courses to reflect the latest developments in research.

With regard to sequence and content, the content and title of some modules (particularly those associated with computing – e.g., BSM 104, BSM 204, BSM 109, BSM 305) do not correspond. In addition, the description of some modules is not well elaborated and requires revision (e.g., BSM 208). In some cases, the content may be too separate from the rest of program (e.g., BSM 204) unless further related to security risks than appears at present. And in other cases, modules appear too advanced (BSM 223) unless more introductory courses are introduced as a prerequisite. We propose that advanced modules be supported by foundation courses on science as appropriate.

The program offers a unique contribution to Cypriot higher education (even southeast Europe) and it staffed by enthusiastic personnel who teach equally enthusiastic students. It promises to train students in a manner highly relevant to labor market requirements. However, the program needs to improve the depth and the quality of its academic dimensions. For instance, a limited number of staff teach the bulk of security specific modules, and do so across a wide range of substantive topics which are outside of their specializations. The research standards of staff also need to be improved. The College's library needs further expansion.
