B. <u>The Internal Evaluation procedure:</u>

Comments concerning the quality and the completeness of the application submitted by the institution of higher education (Doc. Number 200.1), as well as concerning the overall acceptance of and participation in the quality assurance procedures, by the institution in general and by the program of study under evaluation in particular.

The application form that was provided to the evaluation committee was comprehensive in its coverage and clearly presented. The only problem area in relation to the documentation that was identified by the evaluation committee was that a comprehensive feasibility study was not initially provided.

The College Director, Managing Director, Program Coordinator and teaching and administration staff were well prepared for the meeting with the evaluation committee and able to provide satisfactory answers to the questions asked. Additional documentation that was requested was provided.

The student who met with the evaluation committee was engaging and able to provide clear answers to questions on the program. The site visit was informative with the appropriate staff available to demonstrate the use of the sites e.g. the library, computer labs, hospitality labs.





FINDINGS:

1. EFFECTIVENESS OF TEACHING WORK – AVAILABLE RESOURCES

- Organization of Teaching Work

Very few staff members proposed to lecture in the program under evaluation were specialists in the area of the cruise industry and so they were deemed to be inappropriate for the current structure of the program. Overall, the student/staff ratio of the course evaluated seemed to be adequate. In addition, the lecturing staff qualifications were deemed satisfactory for the level required by the specifications of the curriculum.

The committee notes that the program structure as well as the module descriptors were not adequate to satisfy the program's purpose and objectives in terms of specialization in cruise shipping and maritime. The committee feels that the current program structure and content – with major revision as suggested in detail below – can satisfy the requirements for a certificate in Cruise Ship Hotel Operations.

• Organization of Teaching Work

Teaching appeared to be shared equitably across the teaching team and the total teaching allocations of all staff were at an acceptable level.

• Teaching and Teaching Personnel

It was commendable that most modules in the program are to be taught by internal full-time staff.

All staff on the program have qualifications at least one level above the level at which the program is being taught, nevertheless only one staff member has expertise in the area of Cruise Shipping and Maritime.

Moreover, it is an unusually flat organizational structure within the teaching program since all staff members are being classified as lecturers.

According to the submitted documents of Casa College, the one year Certificate on Cruise Shipping and Maritime claims to give students basic knowledge for different functions and operations on board and shore side, guest service, housekeeping, food service, health and safety, entertainment, communication and foreign languages. The courses in the program are diverse in skills found in various disciplines. The aims and objectives of the program under evaluation were not clearly and concisely stated in the application of the college. In addition, learning outcomes were not stated for the program, as well as for each individual course.

Several members of staff who were met by the evaluation committee have been working at the college for many years indicating that there is a very positive work environment. It was clear that the staff were passionate about their jobs and keen to see their students succeed in the program. They offer a student-centred learning experience and feedback from students indicated that there is a very strong rapport between staff and students.

Our overall view is that the proposed program does not reflect current and future trends and needs of the Cruise Shipping and Maritime, and it is not in line with similar programs offered by other institutions abroad. The proposed program will definitely have an impact in terms of providing high quality qualifications, both domestically and internationally, if properly revised to have a more direct focus on cruise ship hotel operations.

The College is not participating in the ERASMUS student and faculty mobility program and has not yet signed exchange agreements.





3. RESEARCH WORK AND SYNERGIES WITH TEACHING

• Research Teaching Synergies

The committee has made a thorough investigation of the research profile of the College's academic faculty members and found little evidence of a research culture amongst staff. This is an area that needs to be addressed given the importance nowadays of 'research led teaching'. It would appear that there is the beginning of an embryonic research environment and this should be fostered.

Administrative Mechanisms

Administrative mechanisms appeared fit for purpose.

Infrastructures / Support

The physical facilities offered to students at Casa College are of sufficient standard considering the existing number of students.

The student who was interviewed by the evaluation committee was satisfied with the level of support that was provided to him and his colleagues.

Financial Resources

Whilst the evaluation committee received a single sheet outlining the current revenue and expenses of the program, it did not receive a detailed feasibility financial study that would provide an overview of the program's sustainability in the coming years.

The SWOT analysis did not deal specifically with the certificate course under review and the evaluation committee was not able to provide input in this section other than to express its concern regarding the sustainability of the program.

CONCLUSIONS AND SUGGESTIONS OF THE EXTERNAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE

The following provides suggestions for improvement on the present situation of the program, the good practices and the weaknesses that were detected during the external evaluation procedure by the external evaluation committee.

• Commendations

DLP.A.E.

The evaluation committee would like to list a number of commendations:

- The enthusiasm of the staff and their commitment to the student experience was most impressive.
- The documentation provided to the evaluation committee was adequate despite the difficulty in material search - and the openness of staff and their responsiveness to requests was much appreciated.
- The efforts being made to improve the infrastructure of the college was impressive.
- The initiative to offer such an innovative program in Cyprus is duly noted, despite the concerns raised by the committee with regards to its content and structure.

• Concerns

Listed below are the key concerns of the evaluation committee after reviewing the documentation provided and visiting the college:

- The name of the program does not reflect the purpose, objectives and course contents. The inclusion of the terms Shipping and Maritime refer to a different set of courses compared to the ones included in the application.
- The limited expertise and research of faculty members in the area of Cruise, Shipping and Maritime is a major concern in the delivery of such a specialized course.
- The lack of agreements with international institutions requires attention.
- The lack of certain key modules specializing to Cruise, Shipping and Maritime in the program is evident and problematic.
- The lack of subscription to appropriate academic electronic material and books relevant to the program requires attention and immediate actions.



• Recommendations

The following recommendations are made to enhance the program:

- It is recommended the Certificate to be renamed to "Cruise Ship Hotel Operations" and all necessary changes are conducted to align the program's purpose and objectives with its content.
- It is important to recruit some staff with qualifications relevant to the proposed program.
- It is critical that a research culture be fostered that will enable the theoretical dimension of the teaching to be developed and to ensure that the program represents best practice.
- A staff development budget should be established to ensure the continuing development of the staff.
- It is important to ensure that there are regular student and staff exchanges with other institutions.
- It is recommended to enrich further the library with electronic material and books in the subject area of the program.
- It is recommended to utilize a more user-friendly student learning platform such as Moodle.
