### II. The Internal Evaluation procedure

 Comments concerning the quality and the completeness of the application submitted by the institution of higher education (Doc. Number 200.1), as well as concerning the overall acceptance of and participation in the quality assurance procedures, by the institution in general and by the program of study under evaluation in particular. The application form that was provided to the evaluation committee was comprehensive in its coverage and clearly presented. The only problem area in relation to the documentation that was identified by the evaluation committee was that a comprehensive feasibility study including evaluation of the market potential and business plan was missing which prevented an assessment on the overall viability of the program.

The College Director, Head of Business School, Program Coordinator and teaching staff were well prepared for the meeting with the evaluation committee and able to provide satisfactory answers to the questions asked. Additional documentation that was requested was provided.

Three of the students who met with the evaluation committee were engaging, able to provide clear answers to questions on the program and very supportive of the offering.

#### FINDINGS:

### 1. EFFECTIVENESS OF TEACHING WORK - AVAILABLE RESOURCES

The number of staff members lecturing in the program under evaluation is deemed to be adequate for the current structure of the program. Overall, the student/staff ratio of the course evaluated seems to be adequate. Also the lecturing staff qualifications are deemed relevant and adequate for the level required by the specifications of the curriculum. The majority of the employed teaching staff has a PhD degree and is highly qualified to deliver the program's courses.

The committee notes that the program structure as well as the module descriptors are not publicized clearly on the website.

The committee deems the organization of teaching work and the qualification of teaching personnel are of high standards both nationally and internationally.

According to the submitted documents of Larnaca College, the four year BA program on Hospitality and Tourism Management claims to provide high quality education by exposing students to various aspects of the hospitality and tourism management industry and to assist students to gain the needed education, knowledge and expertise as tomorrow's hospitality and tourism business managers. The aims and objectives of the program under evaluation are clearly and concisely stated in the application of the college. In addition, learning outcomes are stated for the whole program, as well as for each individual course.

Our overall view is that it is a well-designed bachelor program reflecting current and future trends and needs of the hospitality and tourism industry and it is in line with similar undergraduate programs offered by other institutions. The proposed program will definitely have an impact in terms of providing high quality academic qualifications, both domestically and internationally. Some suggestions of possible improvements are to include the following modules (either compulsory or electives):

- Tourism Planning and Policy
- Destination Management and Marketing
- Research Methodology (compulsory)
- Marketing with a focus on Hospitality and Tourism

There would be merit in considering the move of courses such as second foreign language (German, French, etc.), Special Interest Tourism and Maths to elective courses.

Currently, non-EU students are not allowed to do their placement in Cyprus. It is recommended that the College takes initiatives to ensure the working experience for all students including non-EU students.

The structure and content of the study program is comparable to similar study programs in Europe. The College is participating in the ERASMUS student and faculty mobility program and has signed exchange agreements with 3 European HEIs.

#### 3. RESEARCH WORK AND SYNERGIES WITH TEACHING

#### Research Teaching Synergies

The committee has made a thorough investigation of the research profile of the College's academic faculty members and concluded that the research output by staff members is of comparable to other newly formed institutions and promising for the future. It is likely that research outcomes are being incorporated into teaching.

The college provides incentives to faculty members for publications in academic outlets and also offers reduced teaching loads for obtaining research funds.

#### **Administrative Mechanisms**

Administrative mechanisms appeared fit for purpose.

#### **Infrastructures / Support**

The physical facilities offered to students at Larnaca College are of sufficient standard considering the existing number of students.

The students who were interviewed by the evaluation committee were satisfied with the level of support that was provided to them. The only concern mentioned was the lack of placement opportunities.

#### **Financial Resources**

Whilst the evaluation committee received a single sheet outlining the current revenue and expenses of the program, it did not receive a feasibility study or business plan that provided an overview of the program in the coming years.

As such, the evaluation committee is not able to provide input in this section other than to express its concern regarding the financial viability of the program if student numbers do not increase in the coming year.

# CONCLUSIONS AND SUGGESTIONS OF THE EXTERNAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE<sup>1</sup>

 The present situation of the program, good practices, weaknesses that have been detected during the external evaluation procedure by the external evaluation committee, suggestions for improvement.

#### Commendations

The evaluation committee would like to list a number of commendations:

- The enthusiasm of the staff and their commitment to the student experience was most impressive.
- The documentation provided to the evaluation committee was very good and the openness of staff and their responsiveness to requests was much appreciated.
- The efforts being made to develop the research culture of the college was impressive

#### Concerns

Listed below are the key concerns of the evaluation committee after reviewing the documentation provided and visiting the college:

- Inability to offer relevant placements for non-EU students seriously degrades from the quality of the degree;
- As student numbers grow, the current facilities will not be adequate;
- There are inadequate staff facilities that will retard research activities and make it difficult for private discussions with students;
- There is not currently a research methods module for students.

#### Recommendations

The following recommendations are made to enhance the program:

- A mechanism must be found as a matter of priority to provide non-EU students with suitable industry placements. It has been suggested that it is possible to provide non-EU students with unpaid placements provided that the placement is considered to an external class and that insurance for the students is provided by the college;
- · A compulsory research methods course should be introduced;
- New facilities that have a stronger fit for purpose be found as soon as possible;

- Staff are very well qualified for their roles and appeared enthusiastic educators;
- The fact that the college has a research office and provides financial incentives to staff to publish is most impressive;
- The facilities offered by the college are adequate for the current student enrolment but only just so. Finding new premises will need to be an important priority;
- Finding a means to offer non-EU students relevant industry experience is a critical priority;
- Given the qualifications and research interests of the academic staff, it is surprising that there is no research methods module in the program.
- Already established ERASMUS agreements and collaborations with international HEIs are positive and should be expanded.
