# II. The Internal Evaluation procedure

 Comments concerning the quality and the completeness of the application submitted by the institution of higher education (Doc. Number 200.1), as well as concerning the overall acceptance of and participation in the quality assurance procedures, by the institution in general and by the program of study under evaluation in particular.

[Note: this is a summary, and for details the reader is referred to our more specific comments below].

We were supplied with the document 200.1 and, as detailed below, a number of other documents on our request. We paid a productive site visit on 29.8.2017, where having been met by the Vice-Rector, we noted every effort was made to help us. We interviewed the Dean and three members of faculty and administrative staff (a quality assurance manager, the librarian, a secretary and the head of campus administration). We also met two students who provided us with useful information in the absence of faculty.

As for our view of the quality of the application, this will appear from what we state below. Although there were some failings, it was on the whole satisfactory. It should be noted that, since the University is entirely dependent on a for-profit financial group, all our estimations depend on the future ability and willingness of that group to continue to support the University.

As will appear in our detailed coverage, we are (subject to the notes below) largely satisfied with these aspects. But we had some reservations about measures to prevent and dictate plagiarism, and also about possible excessive teaching loads on certain teaching members teaching the course who also taught pon undergraduate programs.

We were satisfied overall here that we had the necessary information, although we noted inconsistencies in places between title and content of modules, and also some inconsistencies in the designation of the target audience (see para.11(2) and 12(1) of 200.1). In addition we had (1) feelings that certain topics could do with being added to particular modules or transferred from one module to another; (2) a view that some new courses might be added; and (3) a view that, in the light of the nature of the course, more emphasis should be laid on the teaching of quantitative methods; and (4) a view that at least some students on existing courses had never had properly communicated to them the forms on which they were asked to comment on the course.

We had no major worries here, but (1) we thought more could be done to ensure latest research results informed teaching, and (2) we received no detailed information on internal research funding (though, to be fair, the matter does not seem to have given rise to complaint. We also received certain indications that students were not adequately informed of their right to commernt on the course.

It will appear from what has been said above that the proposal provides broadly adequate information (despite certain inconsistencies and omissions). But as a result of looking at the proposal and our discussions at the site meeting we did have a number of concerns that, while not rendering the program unviable, seem to us to need addressing. The details of these concerns are made clear in the findings below and the notes appended thereto.

- 1.1.1: We cannot say whether the criteria are adhered to because this is a new course.
- 1.1.3.2: we cannot say whether the criteria will be adhered to because this is a new course. But we are told that the practice is for curricula to be followed in substance by all teaching staff.
- 1.1.3.4 We are satisfied here, but we would have appreciated a more detailed description of the evaluation process in the course description.
- 1.1.3.5 This is subject to what we comment below on the matter of measures against plagiarism.
- 1.1.4.4 and 1.1.4.5: the procedures for looking after students seem very adequate. We have not been able to observe them in operation.
- 1.1.5 We have received evidence of regular informal communication between staff and students, but feel that the University might consider allocating time between courses.
- 1.1.6 We are told that the Director of the MBA meets with every student once a semester and that advisers are tasked with providing more regular feedback. We feel that some mention of this in writing in the Course Regulations would be an advantage, especially as we understand that an expansion of student numbers is on the cards. This is also relevant to 1.1.7.
- 1.1.8 We are satisfied that this is true for the current MBA and assume that the same practice will be followed in the new program. This also relevant to 1.1.9.
- 1.1.10. We are satisfied as to the transparency of academic mentoring. But we were told that no specific account is taken of this in allocating workload. This is something that might be addressed.
- 1.1.11. We were glad to note the use of Turnitin. But we have doubts as to whether on its own this is adequate to prevent and detect plagiarism. In addition we would have liked to see a written policy dealing with prevention of plagiarism and what happens in the event of suspicions being raised.
- 1.1.12 We were satisfied that there existed an adequate informal complaints procedure, and we noted that there also existed a formal procedure under the University's rules.

- 1.3.2.1 We are on principle satisfied, but we would have liked to see permanent faculty members with a PhD specialising in shipping.
- 1.3.7 We note that out of 11 taught courses, 4 are taught by part-time personnel. This figure seems to us a little high.
- 1.3.9 We had strong reservations on this point, having received reliable anecdotal evidence that some teachers had a load inconsistent with their proper functioning as researchers.
- 1.3.10 We would have liked some assurance that a specific shipping-related hire is contemplated.
- 1.3.11 We have no doubt as to the gentleman's qualification. We note, however, that he co-ordinates two other programs and have some concerns as to whether he will have adequate time.

A number of topics we felt might be profitably added to some modules (e.g. more details of chartering, some content on shipping management and safety issues, and more matters of quantitative methods). In some cases the titles of modules did not fit easily with their stated contents. In addition there were strong arguments for reassignment of certain topics between modules. As well as this we felt that some of the curricula were less than informative and could do with rewriting.
- 2.1.5 We have no argument with the learning outcomes as such, but we feel that they could be more demanding as regards quantitative methods.

There may possibly be other information, including a full feasibility study, embargoed by commercial confidentiality, but we are not aware of the details. (We also note in passing that these minutes give a different figure for the cost of the program than appears elsewhere).

3.1.1 Those who teach the program have a respectable number of publications in respected journals and elsewhere, and the subjects of the program fit fairly closely with the research interests of those providing it.

But, on 3.1.2, we note that the reading material for a number of modules is very light on references to very recent periodical articles. We therefore find ourselves unconvinced.

- 3.1.4 The information we received on publications was dated 2016. We asked for an updated list, which the University endeavoured with some success to provide. We received no details of conferences attended.
- 3.1.5 We received no relevant figures.
- 3.1.6 and 3.1.7 We were provided with little data, despite having interviewed 2 permanent faculty, the Dean and one other member. We understand that a pool of money is made available each year in a sum determined from time to time, that

money from this pool is distributed for research expenses, and we are not aware of any complaints. We have no information about practice in other universities in Cyprus. See too our comments on 3.1.1.

3.1.9 More training in quantitative methods would help. See our comments on 2.1.5.

- 4.2.1 We noted that there were no shipping books currently in the library, and act on the assumption that an adequate number will be obtained if and when the program is approved.
- 4.2.6 We suspect the updating process may not be as efficient as it might be: we found some outdated (though not seriously outdated) books in the library. See too our comment on 4.2.1

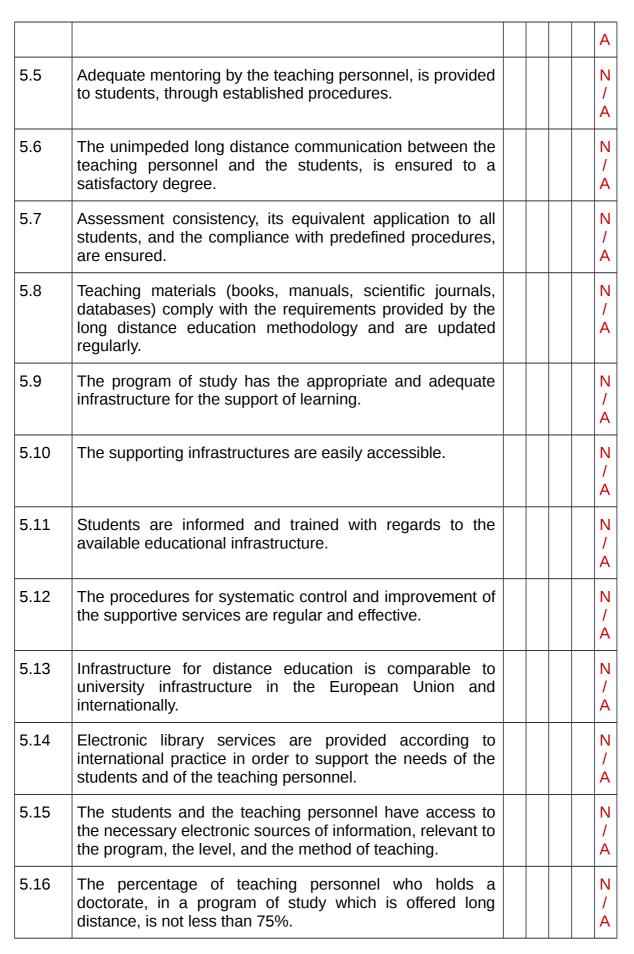
