II. The Internal Evaluation procedure

 Comments concerning the quality and the completeness of the application submitted by the institution of higher education (Doc. Number 200.1), as well as concerning the overall acceptance of and participation in the quality assurance procedures, by the institution in general and by the program of study under evaluation in particular.

The Neapolis University Pafos application for the PhD in History-Political Science was sufficiently completed, presented and detailed.

FINDINGS:

The proposed PhD programme in general is interesting, contextually-embedded, and sufficiently organized. Some members of staff are experienced colleagues, with proven expertise both in research and in tutoring. They are strongly motivated, dedicated and dynamic. However, the EEC expresses grave concern about the number of available academics in order to achieve the aimed programme. Thus, the EEC notices that Professors Georgis and Evriviades are experienced researchers and tutors while Lecturer Maris is also an expert in International Relations/Political Science. Apart from these three potential tutors (if a Lecturer can indeed serve as a PhD supervisor), the other staff may not, from a legal point of view, undertake the supervision of Phd theses. Thus, Professor Hassiotis, one of the most respected scholars in the field of Modern History, as well as Dr. Klapsis are not members of the staff of Neapolis University Pafos. Assistant Professor Papadi is an expert of Classical Philology. Therefore, the proposed programme will end up with only three members of staff.

In order to be sustainable, this programme should be supported by more permanent members of staff in both fields of History and Political Science. The EEC also notes that teaching on the level of Masters is confined to History. The absence of a Masters Degree in Political Science does not support the principle of a PhD in the field.

The Neapolis University Pafos projected PhD in History-Political Science is a well-advanced one in terms of purpose and objectives as well as the competence-based anticipated learning outcomes. Generally, the provisions related to the undertaking of a PhD conform with international practice.

The internationalization of the Neapolis University Pafos in the field of History and Political Science needs to be much improved, especially for a PhD programme. The

University's international inter-Institutional Agreements include only two ongoing agreements. Furthermore, internationalization should also aim at establishing thematic synergies with experienced professors and experts as well as research centres.

Academic staff's research work is tentative and efficient. Professors Georgis and Evriviadis are experienced tutors.

The EEC has not been provided with enough data to evaluate the adequacy of financial recourses. Yet, the increase of financing sources via Institutional Partnerships, EU Research Grants, EEA Financing Mechanism, UNDP etc should be examined as an option of multiplying fund-raising initiatives and access to additional recourses.

CONCLUSIONS AND SUGGESTIONS OF THE EXTERNAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE¹

• The present situation of the program, good practices, weaknesses that have been detected during the external evaluation procedure by the external evaluation committee, suggestions for improvement.

The EEC would like to express its gratitude to the Neapolis University Pafos Authorities for the warm welcome. The EEC, however, takes a generally negative attitude towards the proposal. A programme of PhD in Modern and Contemporary History (not History in general) could be adequately supported by the institution, including the projected DL MA, provided there were additional permanent members of staff to undertake the supervision of PhD students. For a PhD in History, the proposal is generally adequate in terms of procedures, but not in terms of human resources.

For a PhD in Political Science, in addition to the lack of academic staff serving the core of Political Science, the EEC notes the lack of elements widely accepted in international practice as structural requirements, such as a programme of PhD methodology seminars, participation in international conferences and congresses, publications etc, with ECTS allocated accordingly.

Furthermore, it would be advisable to adopt more detailed provisions regarding the admission requirements, such as a minimum grade for the MA of the potential PhD candidate, in order to secure the quality of candidates, as well as information about the required procedures prior to the final assignment of a supervisor (preparation of a thesis project proposal).

Specific remarks, comments and recommendations are provided within the different chapters and subsequent justifications of the partial assessment- grading.

FINAL REMARKS - SUGGESTIONS

Please note your final remarks and suggestions for the program of study and/or regarding particular aspects of the program.

The EEC would like to express its gratitude to the Neapolis University Pafos Authorities for the warm welcome. The EEC, however, takes a generally negative attitude towards the proposal. A PhD programme in Modern and Contemporary History (not History in general) could be adequately supported by the institution (the projected DL MA included), provided that there were additional permanent members of staff to undertake the supervision of PhD students. For a PhD in History, the proposal is generally adequate in terms of procedures, but not in terms of human resources.

For a PhD in Political Science, in addition to the lack of academic staff serving the core of Political Science, the EEC notes the lack of elements internationally accepted as structural requirements, such as a programme of PhD methodology seminars, encouragement to participate in international conferences and congresses, the need for publications etc, with ECTS allocated accordingly.

Furthermore, it would be advisable to adopt more detailed provisions regarding the admission requirements, such as a minimum MA grade for the potential PhD candidates, in order to secure their academic quality, as well as information about the required procedures prior to the assignment of a supervisor (i.e. for the preparation of a thesis project proposal).

Specific remarks, comments and recommendations are provided within the different chapters and subsequent justifications of the partial assessment- grading.
