INTRODUCTION:

I. The External Evaluation procedure

• Short description of the documents that have been studied, of the on site visit meetings, and of the on site visit to the infrastructures.

In advance of the site visit the EEC received the application for evaluation. The documentation included details of the program's general profile, structure and content, teaching personnel, welfare mechanisms, and other relevant information.

The site visit included trips to both the old and new campuses where we heard presentations from the Rector and Vice-Rector, the Dean of the Graduate School, the Head of English, and one other member of staff teaching on this program. We also had the opportunity to meet independently with a range of current PhD students.

II. The Internal Evaluation procedure

 Comments concerning the quality and the completeness of the application submitted by the institution of higher education (Doc. Number 200.1), as well as concerning the overall acceptance of and participation in the quality assurance procedures, by the institution in general and by the program of study under evaluation in particular.

There is no question that the department and university were more than welcoming and that they took the evaluation process very seriously. We were, however, confused about the role of the department in completing Annex 5 (Quality Standards and Indicators for Self-Evaluation). Our assumption was that this section was completed in consultation with program team, however this appears not to have been the case.

FINDINGS:

1. EFFECTIVENESS OF TEACHING WORK – AVAILABLE RESOURCES

- Organization of Teaching Work

Overall this is a well-structured and well supported learning environment. Mechanisms for consultation with students are in place, and staff have been very active in encouraging students' interests and engaging with their concerns. The teaching facilities are modern and well-maintained. The university will soon open its new library, which promises to be an excellent facility. The work of post-graduate students is also supported by the new facilities of the CAT lab. The written material made available to students regarding program structure, etc. seemed clear and accessible. Since this is not a taught program, there were no course websites. PhD students have a room in the department available to them to work in, but few students appeared to use this facility, and some were not aware of it.

Teaching

This program appears to be taught very successfully. The students that we spoke to were satisfied with the amount and quality of supervision they received and the access they had to their supervisors and other members of staff. Evidence of good teaching can also be seen in the doctoral theses made available to us, which were of a very high standard. The procedures in place for giving students ongoing feedback on their work are strong. There are two models of PhD training in operation in the department, one revolving around the CAT lab, the other involving projects not linked to larger research enterprises. Both of these models appear to be operating successfully.

Teaching personnel

The two members of staff responsible for this program are very highly qualified, accomplished academics who are able to supervise on a range of topics. However, the loss of staff working in linguistics over the past few years makes it necessary for remaining staff to supervise at the margins of their expertise. The program would be enhanced with the addition of more staff with different areas of expertise.



2. PROGRAM OF STUDY AND HIGHER EDUCATION QUALIFICATIONS

Purpose and Objectives and learning outcomes of the Program of Study

The program broadly addresses the stated objectives and learning outcomes.

- Structure and Content of the Program of studies

The program is well structed with clear milestones and assessment mechanisms. It will be strengthened with the opportunity to audit MA modules once the MA TAAL and MA TEFL have been resumed.

Quality Assurance of the Program of studies

The composition of the research and assessment committees for individual students ensure quality, as does the comprehensive examination procedure. Students are given ample opportunities to provide feedback on their learning experiences.

Management of the Program of Study

Procedures are in place across the university for the effective management and development of the program, and information about all aspects of program management are transparent and publicly available. Overall, the program is well managed with considerable staff dedication and attention to students' individual intellectual development. Students benefit from a range of informal networks both within the university and beyond, giving them access to additional areas of expertise.

International Dimension of the Program of Study

The staff and students are well networked, and there are possibilities for cosupervision with overseas institutions. Students have ample opportunity to engage with scholars in other institutions, locally through the CAT lab and CYLING, and internationally though conference attendance. This would be enhanced through the provision of increased funding for conference attendance and a small budget to facilitate liaison with doctoral students in other institutions.

- Connection with the labor market and the society

The program trains students for academic careers, as well as providing skills and knowledge relevant to a range of non-academic careers. Students commented that they would like to have more opportunities to assist in teaching Departmental courses in order to enhance their future employability.



3. RESEARCH WORK AND SYNERGIES WITH TEACHING

Research Teaching Synergies

The staff responsible for the program are internationally recognized experts in their areas who publish widely in highly ranked journals and work frequently with international collaborators. The teaching is informed by their ongoing research agendas. Some of the students pursue projects that are linked to the CAT lab, and we note the potential of this facility to enhance students' integration into research networks.

4. ADMINISTRATION SERVICES, STUDENT WELFARE AND SUPPORT OF TEACHING WORK

- Administrative Mechanisms

The administrative mechanisms are well organised, particularly in areas such as housing, social support, career development.

- Infrastructures / Support

The university's new library will open soon. The provision of traditional books and journals compares well with similar institutions and the provision of digital materials indicates genuine commitment to the future development of teaching and research. The program is also supported by the new facilities of the CAT lab. Students would welcome further measures to enhance the sense of community with their peers through activities organized by the department or the students themselves.

Financial Resources

Financial support for the programme seems broadly adequate, though it would be enhanced with the addition of new staff. Students commented that they would welcome further financial support in the form of grants and bursaries. In some cases, the need to work undermined students' academic progress, and in the past some promising students were forced to withdraw for financial reasons. More financial support for students would also aid in future recruitment of students.

CONCLUSIONS AND SUGGESTIONS OF THE EXTERNAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE¹

• The present situation of the program, good practices, weaknesses that have been detected during the external evaluation procedure by the external evaluation committee, suggestions for improvement.

The EEC was very impressed with the quality of this program, though the small number of staff responsible for it imposes some constraints on the range of topics that can be supervised. As with the MA TAAL, we strongly urge the university to hire new staff to teach on this program. The students were extremely satisfied with their supervision and the feedback that they received. There were some concerns about the limited financial support available to students. The EEC also noted that more could be done to enhance the sense of students' community and collective identity.

We would like to make the following recommendations.

- 1) Plans for staff replacement should be fully implemented;
- 2) Staff recruited should specialize in a broader range of topics than currently represented;
- 3) More activities should be organized to give students a chance to interact with one another:
- 4) The university should explore possibilities for providing more financial support to PhD students.
