#### **INTRODUCTION:**

### I. The External Evaluation procedure

• Short description of the documents that have been studied, of the on-site visit meetings, and of the on-site visit to the infrastructures.

The site visit took place on October 09, 2017 at the UCLAN Cyprus premises, Pyla. The committee met with the Interim Rector of UCLAN Cyprus, the Acting Head of the School of Business and Management, the Course Leader, the Director of CEDAR, teaching faculty from both UCLAN Cyprus and UK, administration staff and students.

The following documents were provided: Application for Evaluation-Accreditation-New Program of Study, and power point presentations (Introductory & Institutional presentations. Additional documents were provided during and after the site visit.)

Furthermore, the committee interviewed members of the faculty teaching staff from both UCLAN Cyprus and UK, a group of undergraduate students, administrative personnel related to admissions, registration, library facilities, IT and other admin support. Finally, UCLAN Cyprus facilities in Pyla, Cyprus were visited and viewed, namely all facilities used by teaching areas, library and student meeting rooms, as well staff offices.

### II. The Internal Evaluation procedure

• Comments concerning the quality and the completeness of the application submitted by the institution of higher education (Doc. Number 200.1), as well as concerning the overall acceptance of and participation in the quality assurance procedures, by the institution in general and by the program of study under evaluation in particular.

The internal evaluation 'Application' together with the additional material submitted by UCLAN during our visit (i.e. power point presentations) and examined by us is considered to be complete, satisfactory and illuminating.

### **FINDINGS:**

### 1. EFFECTIVENESS OF TEACHING WORK – AVAILABLE RESOURCES

The committee was particularly satisfied with the infrastructure and premises of UCLAN Cyprus that are of high quality and at least comparable with other private universities in Cyprus and abroad. Library facilities seem up-to-date and fit for purpose and due to the partnership with UCLAN in Preston, UK students of UCLAN Cyprus have access to a broad gamut of library resources including databases pertinent to the proposed program, BA (Hons) Advertising & Marketing Communications such as Mintel and Euromonitor.

The academic staff who has been nominated to teach on this program is motivated and enthusiastic about introducing the new degree. Interviews with students suggested that the academic staff at UCLAN Cyprus is very responsive, easy to approach and provide sufficient and quality feedback despite their workloads and hectic timetables.

The committee has further noted the limited number of specialized staff in the subject matter of Advertising and/or Marketing Communications but received reassurances that this is an opportunity to recruit in this area and also that UCLAN UK will supplement expertise as deemed necessary.

The committee has carefully examined the learning outcomes at program level and believes they are generally fine. However, the committee thinks that they are perhaps somewhat focused on understanding and knowledge, thus missing important higher-level outcomes related to application and practice which are nonetheless covered in module content. In addition to this, a more thorough mapping of assessments to module-level learning outcomes and subsequently of module-level learning outcomes to program-level learning outcomes is a useful exercise that will identify potential inconsistencies in the suggested delivery. A first step in this direction is the table already supplied by the institution outlining the connection between individual modules and program level learning outcomes.

With regards to the proposed curriculum, the committee considers Year 1 to be fairly generic and invites the institution to justify the rationale for selecting compulsory modules such as Principles of Economics. The absence of any marketing module in

Year 1 is presumably a weakness of the proposed curriculum as students would have to wait until Year 2 to study a module relevant to their program title.

The committee also felt that the naming should in some cases be reconsidered. For example, the committee identified the lack of a research methods module in the provision, the content of which is arguably covered in other modules.

The curriculum includes an optional International study module or a work placement module where students can tap into the expertise networks of the partner institution in the UK. The committee probed into the procedures and evaluation of the work placement module and received adequate supplementary information from both UCLAN Cyprus and the partner institution in Preston, UK. UCLAN Cyprus seems to also enjoy strong links with industry including a key media group (DIAS) and other relevant companies that are intended to contribute to the program in various ways.

The committee has been impressed with the quality assurance systems in place which mirror those of UCLAN in Preston. Modules in Years 2, 3 and 4 closely mirror the provision of the equivalent program in the UK (3-year program) with marks being moderated and modules being reviewed by UCLAN UK.

### 3. RESEARCH WORK AND SYNERGIES WITH TEACHING

### - Research Teaching Synergies

UCLAN Cyprus is a relatively new institution primarily focused on teaching (average of 270 hours) with some good pockets of research from staff who attend conferences and publish papers also in the area of marketing. The management team supports conference attendance for staff and there are opportunities for joint PhD supervision with their colleagues in UCLAN UK. The committee is hoping that new hires in this area will result in a sustainable research output in this area that will keep informing teaching.

The committee felt that junior academic staff should have their research time protected as it is important for the program to be informed by relevant research from permanent staff.

The committee is positive about the administration mechanisms in place that are student focussed and include amongst other things a student experience committee, a student-staff liaison committee, Wiser support and counselling service.

The committee has considered the financial projections provided by the institution and thinks that the figures provided including student targets are not unreasonable and that this looks a potentially viable program. Having said that, this is based on assumptions that the committee had no means to verify.

### CONCLUSIONS AND SUGGESTIONS OF THE EXTERNAL EVALUATION COMMITTEE<sup>1</sup>

• The present situation of the program, good practices, weaknesses that have been detected during the external evaluation procedure by the external evaluation committee, suggestions for improvement.

The Committee was provided with detailed and transparent documents to perform the evaluation. Members of the committee were welcomed to the UCLAN premises in Pyla, and were supplied with sufficient material and evidence to complete the evaluation.

In general, UCLAN Cyprus complies with the quality assurance procedures of the UCLAN UK. Each proposed program of UCLAN Cyprus is first accredited by UCLAN UK. The proposed Advertising and Marketing Communications program has been running in the UK a number of years and enjoys accreditation from the Chartered Institute of Marketing. Minor adaptations to the program reflecting the peculiarities of the Cyprus context are appropriately justified by UCLAN, Cyprus.

The content of the program is in line with the varying and dynamic context that requires reflective and critical understanding of theories to be covered. The management team of the program have the professional standards to support it, are motivated academics and they are fully engaged and committed. The teaching staff is appropriately qualified (PhD level) to deliver the program successfully. The program is delivered using a blended approach of theoretical and practical units of assessment. UCLAN UK is committed to supporting UCLAN Cyprus in several ways, e.g. visiting staff, module content, e-library resources, and quality assurance procedures.

The External Evaluation Committee is not expected to submit a suggestion for the approval or the rejection of the program of study under evaluation. This decision falls under the competencies of the Council of the Agency of Quality Assurance and Accreditation of higher education.

The quality assurance process is rigorous and in line with UK standards. The students enjoy the learning experience and support they receive from the teaching staff. This experience is further enhanced through professional links and support from administrative staff. Overall, the committee is positive towards the proposed program in Advertising & Marketing Communications.

However, the committee is concerned about key areas which may be summarized around three main pillars corresponding to issues related to the structure and content of the program, the matching of the learning outcomes to the specific modules offered, and the specialisms of the teaching personnel.

#### Below is a list of issues to be considered:

- 1. Regarding the program's content, the committee recommends a re-examination of Year 1 and what this entails in terms of compulsory modules and content directly relevant to the program title (i.e. marketing and/or advertising).
- 2. The committee also suggests that a dedicated module on research methods is considered as part of the curriculum as this content may not currently be adequately covered in other modules.
- 3. The committee also recommends a re-examination of module titles to ensure that these accurately reflect the content covered.
- 4. The committee identified a gap in the learning outcomes in that higher-order outcomes to do with application and practice are missing from the proposed program despite this practical element being covered in respective modules. Further to this, the committee suggests a clear mapping of individual module assessments to module learning outcomes and from there a subsequent mapping of module learning outcomes to program learning outcomes.
- 5. The committee identified limited relevant expertise to teach the full program in the coming years and supports the management team's best efforts to recruit specialized teaching staff as we believe this is crucial for the successful implementation of the program.
- 6. The committee thinks it is important for the management team to protect the research time of the academic staff as this undertaking will involve a significant investment of time and effort on the part of the academic staff involved. Pertinent research that supports the new program is extremely important for the development of a leading program. As such research time and provision of financial resources and incentives for research of resident staff could be sustained and/or further enhanced.
