#### A. Introduction

The site visit at the Philips University premises took place on January 16, 2020. The External Evaluation Committee (EEC) met with the President (Mr. Philippos Constantinou), Rector (Professor Demetrios Natsopoulos), Vice Rector of Academic Affairs (Professor Constantina Shiakallis), Professor Andreas Hadjis (Dean, School of Economics and Management) and members of the academic and administration staff. The EEC concluded the site visit with physical inspection of the institution's premises (i.e., Library, Cafeteria, Computer Labs etc.). A number of documents were provided and examined, including the Application for evaluation – Accreditation – Program of Study (Bachelor of Arts Business Studies) 200.1, Library documents, Financial Information, and the Institution's internal regulations, rules, and policies.



#### <u>Findings</u>

### A short description of the situation in the Higher Education Institution (HEI), based on elements from the application for external evaluation and on findings from the onsite visit.

- A significant overlap in the titles and content of the courses provided in the programme was evident. For
  instance, the EEC observed that there were courses in International Management I and II, International
  Marketing I, and International Business with significant overlap. The same can be observed for Accounting
  and Finance I, Accounting and Finance II, Foundations of Finance I, and Foundations of Finance II. There are
  also courses in Financial Markets & Institutions and Financial Institutions & Instruments.
- The equipment available is adequate. However, it will require significant investment in IT infrastructure and advanced-level of work in ensuring students receive quality and undisrupted education.
- The number of courses provided appears to be in line with standards and with clear ECTS provision.
- The Programme's collaborations with other institutions requires improvement as links are not institutionalized and rely on Accounting and Finance bodies in the UK.
- The admissions requirements are vague and allow different interpretations about the entry standards and the quality of the student intake.
- The balance of the program was problematic since general courses were provided at the end of the program and specialized at the beginning.
- There is some element of novelty in the choice of courses.
- There was some integration of modern practices and latest findings in the area.
- The teaching methodology is appropriate but can be further improved with more modern approaches and methods of assessment.
- Practical assessment and application of knowledge is emphasised in modules such as Projects I and Projects II.

#### Strengths

- The structure and content of the program includes core, domain A&B, and General Elective courses of adequate ECTS value.
- The Academic oversight of the programme relies on highly experienced academic staff.
- The choice of courses corresponds to the program of study in a good way.
- The program has clear learning outcomes.

#### Areas of improvement and recommendations

- Clearly differentiate from competition exploring the competitive advantage of the target areas.
- Introduce an extensive and efficient internship scheme for the last year students increasing their employment opportunities and practical skills.
- Establish links with external stakeholders and business partners in Cyprus, Greece, and other countries of interest.



- Identify, delineate and strengthen core courses in Business Studies. For instance Information Systems courses are provided as a core course in year 3 and year 4 as an elective in year 1. An introductory information systems module should be core at the beginning and more advanced IS courses in years 2, 3, and 4.
- Introduce an English Language course in the first year of studies.
- Introduce a professional development course in semester 1 that will focus on presentation skills, writing skills, plagiarism issues, and academic work in general.
- Review the titles and content of the courses to ensure limited overlap between the different modules.
- Move courses that are clearly introductory in the first years of the program, and specialised modules in the final years of the program. For instance, "The Dynamics of the Cyprus Economy I" should be an elective and be moved at the beginning of the programme.
- The courses "The Impact of Greek Civilization on Europe I and II" have little relevance with the nature of the program, provide little value to the knowledge outcomes, and not appropriate for the proposed student intake. This, for example, can be replaced with a course on "Introduction to critical thinking in Management".
- A single textbook needs to be identified and selected for each course, not a combination of texts.
- Consider providing different modes of assessment for each course and limit over assessment.
- Law-related courses (e.g., Company Law, Business Law) should focus on and cover all aspects of European Law.
- The codes for each course should reflect the year and level the module. For instance, year 1 courses could be coded as PHIL1, Year 2 courses with PHIL2 etc.
- More novel and relevant to the Cyprus market courses can be integrated at Year 4, such as Digital Marketing, Tourism and Events Management, Banking and Risk Management, and Retailing.
- Provide the latest development in research in teaching the various courses.
- Place greater emphasis on applying knowledge and engaging with industry to implement projects related to the programme.

A complete and coherent course evaluation process is described but it should be incorporated formally into the organizational structure of the School/Dept engaging teaching staff. Student assessment should be part of teaching staff evaluation which is absent. Student to staff ratio should be dropped below 15 keeping a balance at the same time between visiting and permanent teaching staff.

#### <u>Findings</u>

Teaching methods are following the standard approach. Course evaluation and assessment are clear and in place. Pedagogical methods are also standard following international practice. Expected student to staff ratio is 20, close but higher from international standards.



While this is a new proposed program without students yet, we are able to assess the expected quality of students and the policies put in place on the basis of the previous experience with the College and the quality of the staff. On this basis we believe the extant policies and anticipated student quality meets the requisite standards and that requisite improvements will be implemented based on experience and learning.

#### <u>Findings</u>

### A short description of the situation in the Higher Education Institution (HEI), based on elements from the application for external evaluation and on findings from the onsite visit.

- The student admission criteria are provided but outlined in a rather vague way. For instance, the lower entry points for English language should be clearly specified.
- Student welfare mechanisms are present but these need to be more specific and remain to be tested.
- A student support and mentoring scheme is present but this needs to be more detailed and formalized.
- Recognition of prior studies and work experience should be clearer and more transparent. It also needs to be clarified how past College students can transfer to new programmes offered by the University.
- Since this is a new programme, the EEC was not able to verify whether students are satisfied with their learning experience. However, past College students seem to be happy, but the sample was quite low and non-comparable to extract safe conclusions.
- The procedures relating to the internal regulations rules and policies require further refinement, particularly relating to fail and resit of students. These regulations need to be stricter and more transparent. For instance, the Head of Department shouldn't be able to offer an opportunity to change the mode of assessment for failed or resit students as this is unfair for other students. In addition, the compensation mechanism needs to be thoroughly reviewed.
- Elective course choices are available for the students to select.

#### D. Conclusions and final remarks

# Please provide constructive conclusions and final remarks which may form the basis upon which improvements of the quality of the programme of study under review may be achieved, with emphasis on the correspondence with the EQF.

Overall there is a lot to comment, notably the commitment of the founder/president and the quality of the staff. There are missed opportunities to differentiate more from competing programs and adapt the programmes more closely to the advantages and needs of the country, such as health management, tourism management and banking. A number of more generic courses could move to the earlier years, few others could be removed altogether and replaced with more differentiated and relevant ones and the overlapping within and between courses needs to be reduced. In addition, some key areas of management are not adequately covered, reflecting the focus of key staff in economics and finance as opposed to the more conventional management fields. For instance there is not a single course in Organisation Theory, the marketing, international business and strategic management courses are taught by good economists. There is a need to beef up the permanent and more junior staff, address challenges of coordination and identify ways to credit the institution with research undertaken by its faculty that is employed by the key feeder institutions-notably EKPA, OPA, Crete.

All the above said, the programme is no worse than many competing ones and given the quality and experience of the staff, we are satisfied that they will be able to adapt, learn, improve, deliver and make this a success.
